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

In Native culture, the sweat lodge ceremony is used as a way of purification. The sweat ceremony is very sacred and an important part of our way of liv-


ing. The OES Department expects that within the next month, sweats will be performed on a regular basis and anybody is welcome to join.

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### NATIONAL TRIBAL ENVIRONMENTAL SCIENCE **FORUM**



Members of the environmental department; Vickie Kujawa (OES Director), Victor Roubidoux (Aviary Manager), Whitney Warrior (Water Quality Program Manager), and Megan Trope (Aviary Assistant); attended the National Tribal Environmental Science Forum in Traverse City, Michigan on June 7-11. This year's conference was themed "Mother Earth: Indigenous Knowledge and Science to Promote Positive Change." Tribes from across the country gathered to discuss this theme. Topics included continuous tracks of classes that covered air, water, land, and people. At the conference, a booth was set up for four days displaying all of the Office of Environmental Services programs including agriculture, the aviary, waste management, water quality, and air quality. Videos and brochures were made available to the public for further information on each program. Members of OES attended the classes to learn new procedures and regulations. #### Water Pollution Control Program

Hello, to all Tribal members and non-members. The Water Pollution Control Program has finished out its third quarter (May-July) for the grant year. Every quarter I will be updating you, as a whole on the status of the program. May, June and July's sampling tests revealed a high quantity of bacteria. This limit is contributed by the change in weather, rise in temperate and movement of streams. The heavy rains have caused more creek bed erosion and high volumes of turbidity for all creeks sampled by OES. A few creeks have taken bigger hits than others but they all seem to be recovering from the destruction. The new bridge in Fallis has finally been completed. Although the construction degraded the water quality and depths have changed considerably, Bear creek seems to be recovering beautifully. Due to the high volume of bacteria in the creeks, it would be wise to refrain from body contact or recreational activities until further notice. Fish samples were taken from Sand Creek to fulfill grant requirements and these samples will let us know where our streams stand on support of life and quantity of life. OES will preserve the specimen and take them to Shoup Laboratories located at the Oklahoma State University camps for identification and counting. The 4th quarter sampling will begin August 4, 2010. Creeks assessments will be conducted in the 4th quarter to complete a segment of the Water Pollution Control Grant. WPC has a full schedule planned for the 4th guarter and will update the community on the results at the end of that quarter.

OES will also be contributing labor efforts the restoring the Conservation Area and Nature Center. We will accept any volunteer work for the labor that it take to perfect these areas. Once restored, these areas can provide better grounds for education, community involvement and development. We plan to use the areas for Tribal Youth Education, Migratory Bird watching and observations, and recreational opportunities for all the Tribal community (i.e. Fishing, trail hiking, bike riding, picnics, and buffalo and eagle watching). We plan to put our best effort into developing this for the Tribal community and again would love the support and volunteer work from any one. It's your land help us keep it GRAND!

We are still continuing work on a Non-Point Source grant to help with the degradation of our streams. Trainings plus time and effort are essential to getting a grant of this type, but overall this would open up possible jobs for tribal members in the environmental field. We are excited about learning more and doing the proper actions in applying for the NPS grant. Once we have completed all the requirements the Water Pollution Control program will be a stronger asset to the Tribe as well as its members and staff.

If there is anyone interested in volunteering a day sampling or learning more about the program feel free to call and be included in what we love doing on a daily basis.
